- Every two seconds someone in the U.S. needs blood.
- Approximately 36,000 units of red blood cells are needed every day in the U.S.
- The average red blood cell transfusion is approximately 3 pints.
- There are four types of transfusable products that can be derived from blood: red cells, platelets, plasma and cryoprecipitate. Typically, two or three of these are produced from a pint of donated whole blood.
- The average adult has about 10 **pints of blood** in his body. Roughly 1 **pint** is given during a donation. A healthy donor may donate red **blood** cells every 56 days, or double red cells every 112 days.

Hospital News — Gary Myers, CEO



Medical Staff

I am pleased to report that Dr. John Payton, Cmdr. U.S. Navy, has accepted our offer to become our new Pathologist starting November 1, 2017.

We are furthering our discussions with Keck Medicine USC for the provision of part-time clinic services backed up by tele-medicine in the areas of pain management and neurology.

The Medical Executive Committee met with the Senior Managers to begin our 5-year Scope of Services Plan last month. The goal of this process was to reach consensus on what the District's scope of services will look like by 2022. There was strong consensus that the medical staff wanted to expand our visiting specialist model to include such specialties over time as neurology, endocrinology, infectious disease, ophthalmology, psychiatry, pain management, adult dental and others.

Facilities

Once again, the cost for February snow removal services (\$73,000) exceeded our budget (\$68,500) for the entire season. The amount would have been much greater were it not for Cal Fire supervising over 30 inmates to shovel the roof of the 1978 hospital building. With that crew added to 8 others from the California Conservation Corp they were able to remove an estimated 2 million pounds from the roof over a four-day period. This would have been an extremely expensive endeavor if we were paying the going rate of \$45-65 dollars an hour for the labor. Many thanks to Mammoth Lakes Fire Chief Frank Frievalt for arranging this assistance for us. It's been a very expensive winter thus far but we are fortunate to have preserved patient and staff safety through it all and our Maintenance Team deserves special commendation for the hard work and long hours they have put in to accomplish that. We will continue to participate with the Town in applications to FEMA pursuant to any funding relief through the state-of-emergency declaration.

I had a meeting with our OSHPD facility folks on March 2 in Sacramento to review future development concepts and obtain advice. I got some tentative good news on our seismic status for the 1978 building that is still being confirmed. For now, it appears that we will be able to add on to the west side of the 1978 building with an OSHPD compliant building to add to our patient beds and house a new clinic, all with one construction project. This could save the District millions in expense but would require bringing our non-structural components such as fire sprinkler lines and light fixtures up to code.

Programs

We are currently working with physicians from Renown Cardiology to complete their applications for medical staff privileges to be able to read our echocardiograms. Our Medical Imaging Department is ready to perform the studies at this point and we are very pleased to be able to offer this new service at our facility.

Our multidisciplinary total joint replacement program is demonstrating the benefits of best practices applied to these complex elective surgeries. Candidates must pass several established criteria to prove readiness for enduring the surgery and recovery process that will lead to a safe and optimal outcome. Toward that end, patients are evaluated on a multidisciplinary basis to identify risk behaviors and co-morbidities such as smoking, alcohol use, depression, obesity, hypertension, etc. and appropriate staff work with them in a care coordination process to improve their status prior to being approved for surgery. This has improved outcomes, patient satisfaction, and recovery times significantly since instituting this program about a year ago. Kudos to the entire team for putting ***Patients First!***

Finance

Despite the difficult weather conditions, it was a positive month for us although we continue to run behind budgeted volume and revenue year-to-date.

HAWAII CHAPTER



March is Women's History Month, a time to celebrate women's contributions to history and society. The United States has observed it annually throughout the month of March since 1987. History texts and classes are often dominated by male figures, yet women have played and continue to play a major role in the world's economy, politics, and culture.

Here are just a few areas where women have made great strides.

In 1950, women comprised less than 2% of the U.S. military. Today, approximately 14% of active members in the U.S. armed forces are women.

Today, 71% of moms with kids under 18 work. In 1975, fewer than 47% did. Once upon a time, the idea of women working outside of the home was frowned upon and most women who did so worked as maids, seamstresses, took in laundry or worked in one of the traditionally female fields.

At the first Winter Olympic Games in 1924, the only event open to women was figure skating. Only 15 women participated in these games, something that would change drastically over the decades. Women were not allowed to compete in track and field events at the Olympics until 1928 and the 800-meter race was banned until 1960.

Roberta Gibb was the first woman to run and finish the Boston Marathon in 1966. Of course she didn't get official credit for it, as women were not allowed to enter the race until 1972.

Mary Queen of Scots is reported to be the first woman to play golf. Golf today is still seen primarily as a man's sport, but this powerful and scandalous queen couldn't have cared less.

African-American performer Josephine Baker was working in France during WWII, but not only as a singer, dancer and actress. She was also helping the war movement, smuggling numerous messages to French soldiers. She often hid messages inside her dress or concealed with invisible ink on her sheet music.

Until 1846, the practice of obstetrics was a female-dominated field. It was then that most medical colleges decided women could not attend and the newly founded American Medical Association barred women. Legislation intended to regulate the medical profession also made it nearly impossible for young women to pursue a medical career. Today, however, obstetrics is a female-dominated field once again.

Did you know that up until the 1970s, an American woman could not:

Keep her job if she was pregnant. Until the Pregnancy Discrimination Act in 1978, women could be fired from their workplace for being pregnant.

Report cases of sexual harassment in the workplace. The first time that a court recognized sexual harassment in the workplace was in 1977 and it wasn't until 1980 that sexual harassment was officially defined by the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission.

Get a credit card. In the 1960s, a bank could refuse to issue a credit card to an unmarried woman. Even if she was married, her husband was required to cosign. Until the Equal Credit Opportunity Act in 1974, women were not able to apply for credit.

Refuse to have sex with her husband. The mid 70s saw most states recognize marital rape and in 1993 it became criminalized in all 50 states. Nevertheless, marital rape is still often treated differently to other forms of rape in some states even today.

Get a divorce with some degree of ease. Before the No Fault Divorce law in 1969, spouses had to show the faults of the other party, such as adultery, and could easily be overturned by recrimination.

Serve on a jury. This varied by state (Utah deemed women fit for jury duty way back in 1879), but the main reason women were kept out of jury pools was that they were considered the center of the home, which was their primary responsibility as caregivers. They were also thought to be too fragile to hear the grisly details of crimes and too sympathetic by nature to be able to remain objective about those accused of offenses. It wasn't until 1973 that women could serve on juries in all 50 states.






The Mammoth Lakes Library will host

Patrick Armstrong, author of *The Log of a Snow Survey*

Friday, April 7, 5:30 pm

The men and women who measure the yearly snowpack in the Sierra Nevada regularly ski across 12,000 foot passes and at night must dig into rock and log cabins for shelter. On these monthly survey trips they will often ski over 100 miles and climb and descend 25,000 to 30,000 feet along the spine of the Sierra Nevada Mountains.

Patrick Armstrong, a resident of Bishop, has been doing this work since 1972, the year he was a member of the U.S. Biathlon Team. Mr. Armstrong has also been a chemistry and electronics instructor, a wilderness supervisor for the Forest Service, an Alaska commercial fisherman, and presently has a ranch in Idaho.

## Bon Appetit!

Here's a quick and delicious appetizer.

### Chocolate Grapes

50 to 60 red seedless grapes  
1 cup dark chocolate chips  
Wooden picks

Wash and dry grapes. Dry them very well or the chocolate won't stick. Slide 3 or 4 grapes on each wooden pick. Melt chocolate in a microwave-safe container for 45 seconds. Stir well and continue to microwave (if needed) at 15 second intervals until fully melted and smooth. Dip the grapes into the chocolate or use a spoon to pour it over them, letting the excess run back into the bowl. Place on a wax paper lined cookie sheet and chill in refrigerator to firm up. Optional: Sprinkle w/sea salt.

And here's a quick and delicious dessert.

### Chocolate Rum Mousse—Sharon Clark

1/4 cup cold milk  
1 envelope unflavored gelatin  
3/4 cup milk, heated to boiling  
6 tablespoons dark rum  
1 egg  
1/2 cup sugar  
1/8 teaspoon salt  
6 ounces semi-sweet chocolate chips  
1 cup heavy cream  
2 ice cubes

Put 1/4 cup cold milk and gelatin in blender. Blend on low to soften gelatin. Remove blender top. Add hot milk and blend until gelatin dissolves. Add rum, egg, sugar, salt, chips and turn blender on high and beat mixture smooth. Add cream and ice. Blend on high until ice liquefies. Pour into serving dishes. Refrigerate overnight.
