## Hospital News — Gary Myers, CEO

### Medical Staff

*Orthopedics:* We are grateful for the miraculous survival of Dr. Mike Karch who was hit from behind and run over by both axles of a large pickup truck while riding his road bike near his home in Virginia. While suffering multiple orthopedic injuries, Dr. Karch is already out walking and preparing to come to Mammoth next on March 13 to hold ½ day clinics. He will wait until at least April to return to the O.R. He is quite amazing.



*Pediatrician locums:* We welcome Dr. Ed Kody, a very experienced and amiable pediatrician who will be with us for the next 6 months filling in for Drs. Salisbury and Collins for their planned leaves.

*Psychiatry:* We interviewed a very interesting psychiatrist who has experience in an academic setting as well as private practice with pediatric and adult patients in both the inpatient and outpatient settings. He describes himself as a generalist. He and his wife are familiar with our area and plan to pay a visit in late spring to further explore our opportunity of full-time practice here in the Eastern Sierra. ## Ringing the Bell



## Blood Facts

An average adult body contains approximately 1.2 to 1.5 gallons of blood although a newborn baby has only about one cup of blood in its body.

Every two seconds someone in the U.S. needs blood which means approximately 36,000 units of red blood cells are needed every day in the U.S. The average red blood cell transfusion is approximately 3 pints although a single car accident victim can require as many as 100 pints of blood.

The blood type most often requested by hospitals is type O. Mosquitoes prefer type O blood to the rest, but aren’t picky in a pinch. Only the female mosquitoes drink it. Males are vegetarians.

Type O negative donors are universal red cell donors as their blood can be given to people of all blood types. It is always in great demand and often in short supply. Only 7 percent of people in the U.S. have type O negative blood. Type O negative blood is needed in emergencies before the patient’s blood type is known and with newborns who need blood.

Type AB positive plasma can be transfused to patients of all other blood types. AB plasma is also usually in short supply. Only 3 percent of people in the U.S. have AB positive blood type. AB positive type blood is often used in emergencies, for newborns and for patients requiring massive transfusions.

A healthy donor may donate red blood cells every 56 days. All donated blood is tested for HIV, hepatitis B and C, syphilis and other infectious diseases before it can be released to hospitals. Most donated red blood cells must be used within 42 days of collection so new donations are constantly needed. Healthy bone marrow makes a constant supply of red cells, plasma and platelets so the body will replenish the elements given during a blood donation – some in a matter of hours and others in a matter of weeks.

It only takes 20 to 60 seconds for a drop of blood to travel from the heart, through your body, and back to the heart again. Over the course of your lifetime, your heart will pump enough blood to fill two hundred entire train cars full of blood. This is equivalent to approximately one and a half million barrels of blood that is produced from one person.

Swedish blood donors first receive a “Thank You” text when they initially donate blood, **but they also receive a text whenever their blood is used to help someone.** What a lovely gesture!

## What's Happening @ the Cast Off?



### Cast Off Update

Following are highlights of the March Cast Off Committee Meeting:

- ⌋ The Automated External Defibrillator (AED) has been installed and another training session was held March 8. More will be conducted as needed.
- ⌋ The AED needs to be checked regularly to make sure the battery is charged. It will be checked weekly on Monday.
- ⌋ Customers have commented that our signage can't be seen from Old Mammoth Road and the store is difficult for visitors to find. We will pursue improving our signage. A "feather" flag in front of the store is a possible solution as it waves in the wind and could be seen from Old Mammoth. It can be put out each morning and brought in each night. Also, if someone calls to ask for our location, telling them we're next door to the Bowling Alley usually works.
- ⌋ High priced items should be hung on the rack or placed on the shelves behind the front counter. There is a sign that says "STOP: Customers not allowed behind counter. Please ask for assistance."
- ⌋ We will continue to save eye glasses for the Lions Club. Place them in the marked box in the Back Room. We're making arrangements for someone from Lions to pick them up periodically.
- ⌋ Make sure baking pans are complete and tape all parts together. There have been springform and angel food cake pans put out with the bottom pieces missing.
- ⌋ There are snowshoes in Katie's Korner marked \$75. DO NOT reduce the price of these or other items in Katie's Korner without first checking with Patti. As stated in the Cast Off Handbook, if an item has been in there for a VERY long time, the Day Chairman

may reduce the price by a small amount, usually 20-25%.

- ⌋ Remember to date the tan price tags on items so we know how long they've been out on the floor. This helps determine if we should put them on sale.
- ⌋ Please check with the Day Chair before changing the price of any item - that means raising or lowering it.

**CPR Training for Auxiliary**

It will be Thursday, April 26, from 9-10 a.m. in Mammoth Hospital Rooms A & B.

The **Family & Friends CPR** course teaches the lifesaving skills of adult Hands-Only CPR, adult CPR with breaths, child CPR with breaths, adult and child AED use, infant CPR, and mild and severe airway block for adults, children, and infants. Skills are taught in a dynamic group environment using the AHA's research-proven practice-while-watching technique, which provides students with the most hands-on CPR practice time possible.

Family & Friends CPR is for people who want to learn CPR but do not need a CPR course completion card to meet a job requirement. This course is ideal for community groups, new parents, grandparents, babysitters, and others interested in learning how to save a life.

## History of The Cast Off

Last month's newsletter contained Jeanne Standley's history of the Auxiliary. Once again we have Jeanne to thank for recording the history of our Cast Off.

### 1979: The 1st Cast Off—A Trial Run

After the opening of our hospital in 1978, we knew we needed greater funds. In February 1979, the idea of a thrift shop was born. In June 1979, we opened for the summer months in a store occupied in the winter by the "Ski Renter" located directly behind the Shell Station at Main Street and Old Mammoth Road.



In September 1979, we reviewed our progress and the value of our "trial thrift shop." We knew we had found a wonderful source of funds for our Auxiliary, now known as Mammoth Hospital Auxiliary, to fulfill our commitment as stated in our new by-laws "to provide life-saving equipment to our newly opened hospital." Now what to name it? Many typical names were suggested, e.g., "Second Time Around," etc. We decided to work around what our area is noted for -- skiing. Dr. Eckert, who was at the original meetings about the need for a hospital, came up with the idea of a CAST which had been taken OFF of a patient. We voted unanimously in favor of this idea. The Cast Off became our official name.

### 1980: The 2nd Cast Off—A Home of Our Own



The second Cast Off was a rental at the A-frame which later became Gomez's (AKA Fuzz's Place for you old timers). Dr. Eckert used his 10 year-old son, Greg and made a cast of his leg. It was then framed and hung in our building in along with the gold shovel that was used in the hospital ground-breaking in 1976. Unfortunately, when we moved into our own building in 1984, these memorabilia were lost. But the name, The Cast Off, has become well known as it provides a needed service to our locals, our seasonal workers, and our visitors, both summer and winter.

### 1983: The 3rd Cast Off—Our Very Own Building & We Own It!

On May 18, 1983, we held our first ever "Building Committee" meeting which included all executive officers of Mammoth Hospital Auxiliary and two members of the Southern Mono Hospital Board. Interestingly enough, they were also Auxiliary members. In doing this we created a joint effort. In January 1983, we had formed a "Construction Committee" to obtain information regarding all aspects before beginning our project. This included obtaining permits, need for public hearings, etc. All checks would be signed by one member of each Board. Many meetings were held to work up our preliminary costs which, at the final conclusion, showed us we were considering a commitment of \$150,000.00.

After public hearings, Southern Mono Hospital Directors parceled off one acre of their existing 10 acres to Mammoth Hospital Auxiliary. Our ground lease stated that, if for any unforeseen reason our Auxiliary disbanded, the building would then become part of SMHD together with the land. As a public entity they had to charge us \$1.00 per year rental fee.

Now we were ready for financing. Our Auxiliary Executive Board notified the hospital that no equipment would be forthcoming for the next year until completion of our building as we would direct all our income to this project. Our cost projection of \$150,000.00 had been kept so low due to the generosity of our local contractors in giving us bids of labor and material only, and donating their profit portion to us. In addition, much pre-work was donated, e.g., Dave McCoy of Mammoth Mountain provided men and equipment to grade down our knoll for placement of the building, and Tom Dempsey hauled away all the excess soil. Groundbreaking ceremonies for our new Cast Off building took place on July 16, 1983.

Then, near the end of construction, our funds were near depletion. After making inquiries regarding a loan to complete the project and the costs involved, five of our Auxiliary members came forward to the rescue: Norton, Nevins, Tillotson, Melton, and Standley. Finally completion of our building and parking lot was in sight and we opened in June 1984.



After opening in June 1984, these members were all paid in full within one year of issuing the personal loans. What a successful venture this has been with all the volunteers helping! We now make as much in a day as we originally made in a month in our early days.

Over the years we updated The Cast Off by painting inside and out, re-carpeting, enlarging the parking lot and purchasing a "Tuff Shed" for outside. But we needed a larger store. After 21 years we outgrew our third Cast Off. Fortunately, we had \$405,315.00 in savings for a future Cast Off expansion or a new building.

#### **2005: The 4th Cast Off—A New & Larger Location!**

We finally were able to purchase and move into a new building in December 2005. As if it was meant to be, the Body Shop Gym was offered for sale. After many ups and downs the sale was finally completed. The Hospital District purchased our old Cast Off building, parking lot and lease. With those profits and our savings, we were able to buy our own building and own the land. We moved in December 1, 2005, and opened our doors to the public December 15, 2005.



We've been very busy ever since. August 2006 was our biggest Cast Off month in history bringing in \$30,708.22. On August 9, 2006, we celebrated the move to our new location by inviting the entire town to an Open House and Customer Appreciation Party. We are so well known that we now have customers who have moved away from Mammoth Lakes (Colorado, Arizona, Utah, etc.) but their first stop when returning is The Cast Off for necessities!

## **She's A Rebel**

Last month it was suggested that since we're celebrating our 50th anniversary this year, it would be nice to celebrate the history of some of our own members in future issues of this newsletter. Of course the only person who responded came as no surprise. She's a **REBEL** and proud of it. Here, in her own words, is her history. Can you guess who she is? Name on page 10.



I grew up in Austin, TX: got married in 1958 (we celebrate 60 yrs in July); moved to New Haven, CT, where my husband was beginning graduate school. I was a college Junior and HAD to get my Master's degree to begin teaching; had to earn money to support us while my husband got his PhD. I simply could NOT get pregnant. But CT law dictated the use of contraceptives was illegal. The OB-GYN that I went to for contraceptive pills was leery to prescribe pills for me because he would be breaking the law and could be arrested. He was afraid I was a police informant, a SPY! Finally, I convinced him I just needed pills. Such a state law, similar only to Massachusetts and Utah, dictating whether or not I would get pregnant angered me. Immediately, I joined Planned Parenthood and began protesting the law. Our PP meetings were picketed; we were called whores, prostitutes or worse.

In order to *change* the state law, to get it declared *unconstitutional*, we had to open a PP clinic, openly *break* the law and be arrested. Our case went to the Supreme Court. It was fun and exciting to be a part of this landmark decision by the Supreme Court who ruled for women and against CT. In 1965, I ran a PP clinic in a poverty area of Trenton, NJ, teaching poor women how to use contraceptives. As I listened to their woes about 'failed' contraceptives, I began to learn about the illegal abortion racket. Watching women die from botched, illegal abortions was more than I could stand. Soon I was lobbying for legal, safe medical abortions. Thank goodness we won that battle in 1973. For 60 years, women's reproductive freedom has been one of my life's passions....along with family, wild places and wild critters.

PS: In 1972, pregnant with our second child, I decided to have a tubal ligation which is a simple surgery right after baby is delivered. My Ob-GYN said it was illegal *unless* I had my husband's permission~~!! Are ya able to imagine my reaction?

## Increasing Auxiliary Visibility

Recently, several of our members have expressed a concern about how little many of the people who work at the Hospital really know about the Auxiliary and what we do, as well as all the equipment we have donated. So, a few weeks ago, Judy Bornfeld, Lorrie Gould and Jan McPherson met with Gary Myers, Hospital CEO, Sarah Vigilante, Human Resources Manager, and Talene Shabanian, Mammoth Hospital Foundation Coordinator to discuss how to create better communication and increase awareness between the Hospital and the Auxiliary. It was a very productive meeting and plans have already been put into motion.

Thanks to Talene, she has created an entire section for the Auxiliary on the Hospital's website. She has included background and history including information about who we are and what we do, the Cast Off hours, all of our donations to date, even a "Think Pink" flyer! ## Increasing Auxiliary Visibility—Part 2



Remember a few years ago when there was a picture or an article about the Auxiliary in the newspaper every week or so? How long since you've seen any publicity about us?

It's easy to blame the media and say they just ignore us. But that would be untrue. If we don't let them know who we are and what we're doing,

they have every reason to ignore us. It's our own fault that our story isn't getting out there. We do so much for the hospital and the community and we have no one in our organization to work with the media and let them know about it. It has been years since we've had a Publicity Chairman. And we definitely need one!

The job of Publicity Chairman is perfect for someone who likes to work alone on her own time. The job includes establishing a working relationship with local newspapers, radio stations and TV and submitting articles and pictures to them. You don't have to write all the articles yourself. You can enlist the help of other committee chairmen, the day chairmen or any of our volunteers.

Articles can be about who we are, what we do, how we raise funds, various volunteer opportunities at the Cast Off, the hospital and other areas. We're proud of all the equipment we purchase for the hospital and need to let the community know about it, such as how much money is approved for the year and each time a new piece of equipment is purchased. We want to announce when our scholarship applications are available, how much money we award and recognize the awardees. New officers installed each year deserve to be announced. An annual year-end report of our accomplishments including total gifts to the hospital, volunteer hours, scholarships, etc. should be made public. These are things we work hard for and are proud of. Other articles include thank you letters, special fund raising campaigns like Think Pink, disaster relief efforts and requests for new members.

These are just a few of the things we should be publicizing. Getting information out to the public is our job. No one knows about all the Auxiliary does for the hospital and community unless we have someone to tell our story.

Sound interesting? Have a little bit of time to work from home? The internet makes this job so much easier. Please think about it and let Judy or any of the other Board members know if you're interested.

## April is National Volunteer Month

National Volunteer Month is a time to celebrate the work that volunteers do year-round. Volunteerism is instilled at a young age and, in some families, the baton of volunteerism is handed down generation after generation. In many parts of the country, it is the cornerstone of summer vacation or woven into after school programs. Most organizations in small towns, rural counties and even the largest cities would not function without volunteers. Rural fire and ambulance departments remain staffed due to the efforts of volunteers.

Do you know what an hour of your volunteer time is worth? The Washington, D.C.-based advocacy coalition for nonprofits updates the figure annually. The national average has increased to \$24.14 an hour. – up 2.5% from the previous year. In California, the value is even higher than the national average: **\$28.46 per hour!**

## How to Annoy the IRS (Without Getting In Trouble!)

Well, it's tax time again. But no one says you have to go gentle into that dark night. Here are some hints on how to annoy the IRS if you owe them money...



### Pecan Sticky Buns


1/3 cup packed brown sugar  
 1/4 cup butter, melted  
 2 tablespoons maple syrup  
 1/3 cup chopped pecans  
 2 tablespoons sugar  
 1 teaspoon cinnamon  
 1 tube crescent rolls

Preheat oven to 375. Mix brown sugar, butter and maple syrup. Spread in bottom of greased 8-inch round baking pan. Sprinkle with pecans.

Mix sugar and cinnamon. Remove crescent dough from can but do not unroll. Cut crosswise into 8 slices. Dip both sides in cinnamon sugar and place in pan. Sprinkle any remaining sugar mixture over tops.

Bake, uncovered, 18-22 minute or until golden brown. Immediately invert onto a serving plate. Serve warm.
